

Our Curriculum Intent

Music the soundtrack to our lives. Music connects us through people and places in our ever-changing world. It is creative, collaborative, celebratory and challenging. At Walthamstow Academy, music should bring our community together through the shared endeavours of: singing; ensemble playing; experimenting with the creative process; listening to friends and fellow pupils, and, of course, performing. The sheer joy of music-making can feed the soul of a school community, enriching each student while strengthening the shared bonds of support and trust which make a great school.

Our Curriculum Progression Model

When sequencing material we aim to build students' performance, composition and listening skills though the 5 years, with each strand becoming more complex, and involving a wider range of musical knowledge as a student progresses.

KS3

- In Year 7, students are introduced to the three stands of music. They experience whole-class singing, solo keyboard performance, ukulele performance and djembe performance. This range of instruments is chosen to help students understand how pitches and timbres can influence the experience of the listener, and how different instruments can require radically different techniques during performance.
- In Year 8 we revisit the ukulele to build some higher-level skills and to understand how chords differ from melody, and the relationship between the two. Students are also introduced to musical notation in the form of chord diagrams and tablature. They also build listening/appraisal skills through an exploration of film music and its effect on mood. Students finish the year by building ensemble skills as they participate in a pop band with their classmates.
- In Year 9 we further develop knowledge of musical theory and listening by introducing the black American musical tradition. Students explore gospel, blues and jazz through performance, listening and composition.

KS4

• Students in Year 10 and 11 who have chosen to pursue GCSE Music follow the OCR specification. They find the foundations they have built at KS3 are significantly developed, and they are introduced to a much more rigorous treatment of musical theory and notation.

Our KS4 curriculum prepares students for further studies, either at A-Level or Level 3 BTEC courses
