Computing	Students are currently delving into the topics of network security, preventative measures for network threats, and Python coding skills, building on the strong foundation they established last term when they explored the components of computer systems and data representation. Their enthusiasm and engagement with the material have been exceptional, resulting in significant progress and a deeper understanding of these key computing concepts. Design Technology	Since September, students have been working on Component 1, which accounts for 60% of their overall grade. They've completed the research phase and are now finishing the experimentation stage, where they have turned their 2D ideas into 3D models. The next step is to create a prototype or a refined version of their final design. I'm very impressed with the quality of their work and the effort they've put in. The atmosphere in the workshop is excellent, and I'm excited to see their finished projects. After Christmas, students will begin Component 2, worth 40% of their grade. This will conclude with a 10-hour practical assessment in the workshop. To succeed, they'll need to maintain a steady pace each week and plan carefully for this assessment.

	To support your child, ask them to share their online portfolios with you. Ask questions about their research, why they have chosen a particular designer, and why they like them. This will help develop their oracy skills and strengthen their opinions on design. They were assessed on all these topics in the recent PPEs. We are now focusing on giving feedback and improvement time so that students know how to add marks to what they achieved in their PPEs. Each week, we are supporting exam preparation with English Power Hour on Wednesdays after school. During this intervention, students complete an exam question under strict exam conditions to build stamina, resilience, and confidence. At home, students should continue to focus on English Literature revision using flashcards and model essays to help prepare for the next set of PPEs in March and to accelerate their progress in lessons. History	The History department has been very impressed with the Year 11 students. So far this term, students have focused on completing the final parts of our Weimar and Nazi Germany module. At first, many found the complex political changes and key historical interpretations challenging, but they have shown real determination and made excellent progress. Students have developed stronger analytical skills, particularly when evaluating the impact of events such as the Treaty of Versailles, the Munich Putsch, and Hitler's rise to power. We are also very proud of the maturity and effort shown during their recent PPE exams for Papers 1 and 3. Many students demonstrated improved exam technique, using evidence more effectively in source questions and writing well-structured explanations and judgments. Their resilience and commitment to refining their historical thinking have been brilliant to see. Homework continues to be set weekly, and students should ensure their revision tasks and practice exam questions are completed to a high standard. We encourage parents and carers to discuss what students are learning in History, including the significance of past events and how they shaped the modern world. Maths	In Maths, we are very pleased with how Year 11 have started their GCSE journey this year. Most students are working hard and have the right attitude in lessons. They have now completed their Progress Point Test, their PPE1, followed by DIRT (Dedicated Improvement and Reflection Time). Students have been shown how they can gain up to 10 extra marks per paper. To keep up with regular practice, all Year 11 students will be working on two past exam papers per week: • Hannah Kettle half past paper for 45 minutes at home. • Maths Power Hour paper for 50 minutes in the hall. All papers are expected to be completed under timed conditions, self-assessed, and clearly labelled with the percentage and grade. Students will track their results and progress weekly. Students are set 30 minutes of Sparx homework weekly, due on Wednesdays. If a student cannot complete the homework to 100%, we encourage them to see their teacher before the due date. We run Sparx Club after school and at lunchtime on Tuesday and Wednesday. As we are all aware, maths cannot be learned overnight as it builds on prior knowledge. Students need to practise regularly and deepen their understanding further. PE	Since the start of the year, PE students have explored a wide range of GCSE PE theory and practical content. We are currently covering commercialisation in sport and the impact it has on performers, officials, and spectators. Students are

continuously growing in confidence when applying this knowledge to real sporting examples.

In our health and fitness unit, students have learned about the different components of fitness and how they relate to performance. They also explored somatotypes, obesity, sedentary lifestyles, and the importance of nutrition, gaining a clear understanding of how lifestyle choices can impact physical, emotional, and social well-being. Many students have excelled in linking these topics together and applying them to exam-style questions.

Alongside the theory work, students have continued developing their practical performance in netball, football, and handball. It has been fantastic to see their teamwork, communication, and tactical decision-making improve, with many students showing resilience and a willingness to challenge themselves in competitive situations.

Science Combined

The Science team is very pleased with Year 11. They have shown a strong and mature approach to challenging concepts. There is a great emphasis on using time wisely, working hard, and thinking hard during lessons, and students have shown excellent ambition since starting Year 11. The class is now studying Homeostasis, a biology topic that is particularly knowledge heavy. Students will need to prioritise memorising core facts and key processes to keep up with the demands of the course.

As a class, they show good engagement, but one of our key areas for development is improving their confidence and accuracy with six-mark questions, particularly those involving practical work. Many students are still hesitant to write full methods or include the level of detail needed for the highest marks, so this will remain a strong focus in lessons.

To support their GCSE preparation, they have been completing a past-paper homework each week to develop exam technique, build confidence, and strengthen their ability to work under exam conditions. Please support your child in completing these in exam conditions and self-assessing with a green pen. There is also a folder on Microsoft Teams that students can use to access extra resources and work.

Triple Science	This half-term, our triple scientists have completed some challenging chemistry topics, in which they performed exceptionally well. We are now moving into a series of biology topics. These can be more demanding, as triple content often goes beyond what students have previously covered in combined science. This means we are frequently linking new material with prior knowledge, and students need to be flexible in drawing from both. The content is manageable, but only if homework is completed to a consistently high standard. Homework will frequently involve six-mark questions or printed exam-style questions. Please support your child by checking that these are completed thoughtfully and thoroughly. As all students in this class are working towards grades 7–9, they should be aiming for around 70–80% on these tasks. Scores consistently below this indicate that they should be doing additional revision to strengthen their understanding.
